BIGELOW WILDLIFE PRESERVE

SOLF Trustee Lawrence Spezzano continues to spearhead efforts to combat invasive plants at the entrance to Bigelow Wildlife Preserve and along the trail to the viewing platform. With help from the town DPW, several large granite slabs were rearranged and native pollinator plants have been planted to create a more attractive entrance area. On November 28th, a group of volunteers from SWCA Environmental Consultants helped spread wood chips and pull up invasive honeysuckle along the trail.

BEALS PRESERVE PARKING AREA

We are happy to announce that there is now a small parking area at the Beals Preserve Main Street Field on Route 30. The entrance to the parking area is on the south side of Main Street, between two stone pillars, east of Northborough Road and west of Chestnut Hill Road. Pull into the fenced area and park perpendicular to the road at the stone wall, to the right of the sign post. Walk down through the field from the opening in the fence and then across the bridge over the Wachusett channel.
