

Beals Preserve

A section of the Old Farm Lane (the main walking path) at Beals Preserve has been loamed and seeded. Please do not walk on it and please keep your pets off it. There is now a hard gravel path alongside it for you to walk on. You may also walk on the grassy area at the edge of the loamed area. This work is part of the maintenance project to try to deal with the wet conditions often found at that part of the trail. Thank you for your cooperation.
